KOINUMA MICHIO (B. 1936)

Koinuma's work is reminiscent of Chinese and Japanese ancient clay forms. He implements the *tatara* method, using flattened plates of clay, to create his characteristic strong shapes. Koinuma incises his motifs directly onto the clay body and adds slip to form designs. He uses either *Shigaraki* clay or a type of kaolin clay called *gairome*, which are fired at a lower temperature than those typically used for kaolin.
